Research Guide

Before reading: Preview this research guide by reading the

questions. Preview the articles and blog by reading titles, captions, subtitles, and by studying the graphics.

During reading: As you read, make connections to your own experiences and knowledge, develop readers' questions, and make inferences about the impacts of food waste. Jot down interesting, surprising, or pertinent facts in the "Fact Collector Sack" on the last page. Answer the research questions as you read each article.

3. Consider the tips listed for eliminating food waste. Select two and discuss the pros and cons of each. Could you successfully implement them in your home, or would they just be too much trouble? Explain.

4. Draw a diagram of the food waste cycle from "farm to fork."
